## **SECTION A**

[35 marks]

Since the rules forbid half marks it is important to find a way to distinguish between more and less serious errors. Otherwise, in this kind of exercise, it can become difficult to reflect the range of performance. The scheme below divides the passage into short sections assigned [1 mark], [2 marks], or [3 marks].

In the case of three-mark sections, assign full marks to correct answers or answers with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [2 marks]. For [1 mark], candidates should have no more than two major errors, or four minor errors or a combination of one major error and two minor errors.

In the case of two-mark sections, assign full marks to correct answers or answers with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark].

In the case of one-mark sections, assign the mark to correct answers or answers with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.)
