


7. The diagram shows the structure of a typical hurricane (typhoon, tropical cyclone) in the northern hemisphere.


**11.** The map shows part of the global pattern of low calorie intake (undernourishment).


13. The map shows cities experiencing high or negative growth rates in countries with differing levels of urbanization.

14. The map shows part of a city in Asia. The scale of the map is 1 : 20 000. The contour interval is 20 metres.




