- (c) ώς δ' ὅτε ... ποδώκεα Πηλεῖωνα (lines 189–193). Analyse the simile. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [4]
- (d) λαοῖσιν δ' ... δεύτερος ἔλθοι (lines 205–207). Contrast the behaviour of Achilles with that of Hector. Quotation of the Greek text is **not** required. [2]

- (b) θεῶν τις (line 298). Suggest which god Alcestis might be referring to **and** explain why she might have decided not to use his name. Quotation of the Greek text is **not** required. [2]
- (c) εἴεν·σύ ... φήσεις σύ (lines 299–302). Explain what Alcestis does **not** ask for, **and** why. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [2]
- (d) Write out and scan οὐχ ἥσσον ... ἐμῶν δόμων (lines 303–304). Indicate elisions where necessary. [2]
- (e) καὶ μὴ 'πιγήμῃς ... τοῖς πρόσθ' (lines 305–310). Explain why, according to Alcestis, Admetus should not put a stepmother over their children. Quotation of the Greek text is **not** required. [3]
- (f) Analyse how Euripides portrays Alcestis's view of the role of women. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [8]

- (b) ἦν καὶ νῦν ... μεγίστην ὥκησαμεν (lines 3–6). Outline what Pericles believes the Athenians will be remembered for. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [3]
- (c) τὸ δὲ μισεῖσθαι ... αἰείμνηστος καταλείπεται (lines 7–10). Analyse why Pericles thinks it is worth incurring hostility in the pursuit of empire. Quotation of the Greek is **not** required. [3]
- (d) τοῖς παροῦσι πόνοις (line 12). Suggest **two** recent events to which this phrase could refer. [2]
- (e) Analyse how Thucydides creates a rhetorically effective end to Pericles's speech in this extract. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [8]

- (d) ἀλλ' ἀπέκτειναν ... ἄλλοι ἀνθρώποι (lines 13–14). Explain why the prosecution's actions in these lines could be seen as surprising. Quotation of the Greek text is **not** required. [2]
- (e) Analyse how the speaker seeks to discredit the prosecution in this extract. Support your answer by quoting the Greek text. [8]
