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SECTION A

1.(a)

- (i) Penelope has produced Odysseus' bow [1 mark] and set up the archery contest with herself as the prize [1 mark].
- (ii) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iii) Mark only for length of syllables. [1 mark] per line if all correct, no mark otherwise.
- (iv) [4 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [3 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable character portrayal or for an excellent portrayal with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [2 marks] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer poorly grounded on the text or for an acceptable appreciation of the text with a poor answer.

- (i) Odysseus has strung the bow and surprised the suitors [1 mark] by killing Antinous [1 mark].
- (ii) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iii) Mark only for length of syllables. [1 mark] if all correct, no mark otherwise.
- (iv) [4 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [3 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable character portrayal or for an excellent portrayal with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [2 marks] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer poorly grounded on the text or for an acceptable appreciation of the text with a poor answer.

- (i) Medea has been weeping [1 mark] because she has discovered that Jason will marry Creon's daughter [1 mark].
- (ii) Mark only for length of syllables. [1 mark] per line if all correct, no mark otherwise.
- (iii) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iv) [4 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [3 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable character portrayal or for an excellent portrayal with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [2 marks] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer poorly grounded on the text or for an acceptable appreciation of the text with a poor answer.

- (i) Medea's complaint was that Jason was going to marry another [1 mark] and banish her and her children [1 mark].
- (ii) [2 marks] for a correct answer, or for an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iii) Mark only for length of syllables. [1 mark] per line if all correct, no mark otherwise.
- (iv) [4 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [3 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable character portrayal or for an excellent portrayal with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [2 marks] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer poorly grounded on the text or for an acceptable appreciation of the text with a poor answer.

- (i) Bdelycleon and his slave Xanthias are trying to restrain Philocleon [1 mark] as he struggles to escape to the jury courts [1 mark].
- (ii) Ancient [1 mark] honey [1 mark] Sidon was a tragedy [1 mark] by Phrynicus [1 mark]. For full marks ([4 marks]) there should be some attempt to relate the elements to one another.
- (iii) [2 marks] for a correct answer, or for an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 marks]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iv) Mark only for length of syllables. [1 mark] per line if all correct, no mark otherwise.

- (i) Philocleon, addicted to jury service [1 mark] is being subjected to a vigorous debate to cure his addiction [1 mark].
- (ii) The jurors could be rich (but are not); jury pay is doled out in drips; jurors are kept poor; the intention is that they will be hungry to attack the enemies of the democrats. [1 mark] for each point up to a maximum of [3 marks].
- (iii) They should make the jurors rich [1 mark]; the tribute from the empire would provide the means [1 mark]; the Athenian victory at Marathon means that they deserve the money [1 mark].
- (iv) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.

- (i) Solon [1 mark] tells the story to Croesus [1 mark] to teach him that he is not the happiest man in the world [1 mark]. Candidates will answer the last part in all sorts of ways; reward anything that is true.
- (ii) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iii) [4 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [3 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable assessment or for an excellent assessment with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [2 marks] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable assessment poorly grounded on the text or for an acceptable appreciation of the text with a poor assessment.
- (iv) Death [1 mark].

4. (b)

- (i) Apollo's oracle is speaking [1 mark] to defend itself and Apollo from Croesus' complaints [1 mark].
- (ii) Give [3 marks] to correct answers or answers with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [2 marks]. For [1 mark], candidates should have no more than two major errors, or four minor errors, or a combination of one major error and two minor errors.
- (iii) [3 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [2 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable assessment or for an excellent assessment with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. Otherwise, award no mark.
- (iv) Croesus had received an ambiguous response to his enquiry [1 mark]; he should have asked a further question to resolve the ambiguity [1 mark]. Candidates will respond in many ways and should be judged sympathetically if these two points are made explicitly or implicitly.

- (i) Candidates will refer to Socrates' arrogance in general and his bald assertion that the prosecutors are inferior; others will say other things. Reward on merit, [2 marks] for a good answer, [1 mark] for a satisfactory one.
- (ii) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.
- (iii) 'An inferior person is not allowed to harm a superior person [1 mark]. The plausibility will depend on whether you accept Socrates' definition of 'harm'; common experience shows that the proposition is absurd on the normal view of 'harm'; with Socrates' view, it is another matter [2 marks]. This is a possible approach, but candidates will have a variety of ideas which should be judged on their merits.
- (iv) [3 marks] for a good answer rooted in the text. [2 marks] for an answer which either shows a good command of the text and an acceptable assessment or for an excellent assessment with only a satisfactory grounding in the text. [1 mark] for an acceptable answer grounded on an acceptable grasp of the text. Otherwise, award no mark

- (i) Given a choice between a grudgingly offered fine and death as a penalty [1 mark] the jurors have chosen death [1 mark].
- (ii) That he should say the sort of things that would save his life [2 marks]
- (iii) Death will overtake Socrates [1 mark] because they are both slow [1 mark]; wickedness will overtake the accusers [1 mark] because they are both fast [1 mark].
- (iv) [2 marks] for a correct answer or an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark.

SECTION B

6-10 Essays are notoriously hard to mark; Here follows an attempt to characterize what might be expected for a given mark.

The essays are worth only [10 marks] each; you should not expect anything very long. Also, please note the syllabus set and do not expect material outside it (although you may reward such material).

- **9 or 10** This suggests an essay which shows a detailed knowledge of the text coupled with a persuasive answer to the question posed.
- 7 or 8 This suggests an essay which shows either a detailed knowledge of the text coupled with a weaker or less well focussed answer to the question posed **OR** one which shows a reasonable knowledge of the text coupled with a persuasive answer to the question posed.
- This suggests an essay which is competent and worthy but which shows little or no knowledge or understanding beyond the obvious. Occasionally, such a mark will indicate an essay in which gross error is combined with excellent knowledge or judgment.
- 3-4 This suggests an essay which combines pedestrian knowledge and judgment combined with some error.
- 0-2 This suggests the essay of a candidate who has read little or nothing of the syllabus.
